E. Power Outages

024-2023

WHEREAS there is an Electrical power transmission grid owned by Hydro Quebec (HQ) where residents of Upper Pontiac (Sheenboro, Chichester, L'Isleaux-Allumettes, Waltham) and some residents of Mansfield-Pontefract are clients:

WHEREAS this said grid is not integrated into Hydro Quebec's Power Transmission Network;

WHEREAS this said grid has no meaningful redundancy in the event of equipment failure leading to unnecessary and lengthy power outages;

WHEREAS this said grid relies solely on Ontario for surplus electricity during peak demand;

WHEREAS in the event of a power outage, without timely and an accurate information from Hydro Quebec, residents cannot fully prepare for the situation;

WHEREAS a power outage on February 4-5th, 2023 left many residents of Upper Pontiac without power for a period of more than 36 hours in dangerously cold temperatures (-39 degrees Celsius);

WHEREAS during the outage on February 4-5th, 2023, communications from Hydro Quebec to residents through the HQ App, Website or otherwise was false and misleading;

WHEREAS during this outage HQ failed to have timely and accurate communications with Municipal and local emergency services especially concerning the length of the outages, plans for restoration and the prioritization of areas/sectors to be restored;

WHEREAS this length of the power outage had direct cause in the failure of telephone and internet services, leaving the residents without means of communication for emergency services in potential life-threatening circumstance;

WHEREAS the Municipality and its residents suffered undue expenses, loss and damages, during this outage;

WHEREAS this outage is the only the latest in a series of lengthy outages over the past several decades;

WHEREAS with the provincial & federal incentives and programs for further electrification of heating systems, vehicles, etc.; the demand for power and the load on the grid will only increase exponentially;

THEREFORE, it is moved by Councillor Dick Edwards, that the Municipality of Sheenboro make a formal request to Hydro Quebec for the following:

A Formal Plan, with timelines, to improve their infrastructure to fully integrate the Upper Pontiac into HQ Power Transmission Network ensuring redundancy for hydro services in our area;

Improvements to communication with the Clients (residents) as well as with the Municipality, before, during and after an event;

Compensation for the residents and Municipalities who may have suffered unnecessary expenses, loss or damages due to the outages;

A public meeting hosted by the Municipalities, where HQ can respond to the three items requested above;

AND, that this resolution be forwarded and sent to ALL Municipalities within the MRC Pontiac, Warden Jane Toller and MNA André Fortin for their support; as well as to the Minister responsible for the Outaouais, Mathieu Lacombe; the Minister of Economy, Innovation and Energy, Pierre Fitzgibbon; the Minister of Public Security, Francois Bonnardel; and a that formal complaint be made to the Regie de L'Energie concerning the above.

F. Cellphone Services

WHEREAS the Municipality of Sheenboro and its surrounding areas are isolated and therefore are poorly served or not served by an efficient cellular network;

WHEREAS during a power outage on February 4-5, 2023, the length of the power outage had direct cause in the failure of telephone (landline) and internet services, leaving the residents without means of communication for emergency services in potential life-threatening circumstance;

WHEREAS cellular coverage is now an essential service and a determining issue in rural Quebec and Canada to ensure the safety and development of rural communities;

WHEREAS the absence of complete cellular coverage is, not only a public safety issue, but a hindrance to the attraction of visitors and businesses and hinders the retention of families in communities with poor or no cellular coverage;

WHEREAS improved cellular coverage has been a priority identified by this Municipality in their recent Family & Seniors action plan; for all the reasons indicated above;

WHEREAS communications, public safety and economic development are jurisdictions shared between the federal and provincial governments;

THEREFORE, it is moved by Councillor Richard Bradshaw that the Municipality Sheenboro make the following formal request:

To ask the federal government and the ministers of the departments concerned to make a financial commitment to guarantee sufficient cellular coverage in all rural communities, including the Municipality of Sheenboro and others in the Pontiac;

To ask the Quebec government and the ministries concerned, notably the Minister of Economy, Innovation and Energy, to coordinate with the federal government and to quickly commit to ensuring complete cellular coverage for all rural

communities, as it has committed to do to complete the High-speed internet network;

that this resolution be forwarded and sent to ALL Municipalities within the MRC Pontiac, Warden Jane Toller and MNA André Fortin and MP Sophie Chatel for their support; as well as to the Minister responsible for the Outaouais, Mathieu Lacombe; the Minister of Economy, Innovation and Energy Pierre Fitzgibbon; the Minister of Public Security, Francois Bonnardel; and a that formal complaint be made to the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications (CRTC) concerning the above.

G. Bell Canada – Telephone & Internet infrastructure

AND,

WHEREAS there is an ongoing and increased number of recent complaints from ratepayers regarding recurring problems experienced with Bell Canada's services (telephone and/or internet);

WHEREAS Bell Canada has failed to provide proper maintenance to their landline infrastructure in Sheenboro;

WHEREAS the lack of maintenance by Bell Canada has created a serious number of outages to their services;

WHEREAS the Bell Canada station on L'Isle-aux-Allumettes, which services several municipalities landlines, telephone and internet services, can only operate for a maximum of 6-8 hours without power to their building;

WHEREAS during a power outage on February 4-5, 2023, the length of the power outage had direct cause in the failure of telephone (landline) and internet services, leaving the residents without means of communication for emergency services in potential life-threatening circumstance;

WHEREAS it is recognized that numerous Bell Canada clients do not have cellular phone service as there is no or very restricted reception service;

WHEREAS the outages have created a serious public security issue where residents do not have access to 911 or internet services during the outages;

WHEREAS it is recognized that Bell Canada has conducted some maintenance to their service lines on Sheenboro over the past few months, however, the problem continues to persist;

WHEREAS Bell Canada continues to collect their full rate of their monthly service charges despite the numerous outages.

THEREFORE, it is moved by Councillor Dick Edwards that the Municipality of Sheenboro make a formal request to Bell Canada for the following:

- A Formal Plan, with timelines, to improve their infrastructure to ensuring appropriate back-up power to their stations to maintain telephone and internet services in our area during an outage;
- Improvements to communications with the residents of and with the Municipality directly; before, during and after an event;
- A public meeting hosted by the Municipalities, where Bell Canada can respond to the concerns above;

AND,

that this resolution be forwarded and sent to ALL Municipalities within the MRC Pontiac, Warden Jane Toller and MNA André Fortin and MP Sophie Chatel for their support; as well as to the Minister responsible for the Outaouais, Mathieu Lacombe; the Minister of Economy, Innovation and Energy Pierre Fitzgibbon; the Minister of Public Security, Francois Bonnardel; and a that formal complaint be made to the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications (CRTC) concerning the above.

WHEREAS, for public safety purposes, we request Toponymie Québec allow for a section of what is currently recognized as Galligan Road to be officially renamed Lew Miller as it has been known locally for some time.

WHEREAS, the section of Galligan to be renamed has not connected with the rest of Galligan Road for years.

WHEREAS, it is currently very difficult for fire and ambulance services to locate this section of road as it appears as Fire route 24 on some maps, Lew Miller on others and Galligan Road on others.
